

BCIT Project Management Associate Certificate – Part Time Studies

The courses in this program run in the evening and/or online and the student can earn a BCIT Associate Certificate in Project Management <http://www.bcit.ca/study/programs/5085acert#courses>

The courses provide project management education that can be applied towards the Project Management Institute (PMI)[®] certification exam for the PMI[®] Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM)[®] credential and the PMI Project Management Professional (PMP)[®] credential.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I register for a course and get started in the program?

Students register and attend individual courses in the program and progress through the program at their own pace. Registration usually opens approximately 45 days before the term starts. It is recommended to register early since some courses fill up fast. This link shows the [key registration dates](#). Courses start in January, September, and April. OPMT 1187 is the first course to take since it is a pre-requisite for other courses in the program. OPMT 1187 can be taken simultaneously with an OPMT 25xx course in an academic term. How long does it take to complete the program and earn the certificate?

A typical student can complete the certificate within 2 years. It depends on the number of courses taken each term by the student. A typical student takes one or two courses each term. There are three terms a year, January, September, and April. Courses usually run in the evening from 6:30 to 9:30 pm, once a week for 12 weeks (total of 36 hours). Online courses have a more flexible schedule. The number of courses taken each term depends on the student's personal schedule and course availability. There are also course pre-requisites that vary by course.

How much does it cost to complete the certificate?

There are 7 required courses and one elective. Course fees are subject to change.




What textbooks are required for each course in the program?

Can a student earn Project Management Institute (PMI®) professional development units (PDUs) when taking a course?

Yes. The student earns 33 PDUs per course for each of the required courses in the certificate program. See list below. These courses also qualify towards project management education needed when applying with PMI® for CAPM® or PMP® certification. Each course is 33 hours of project management education. Applications with PMI for CAPM® and PMP® Certification require 23 hours and 35 hours of project management education respectively.

- OPMT 2510 Project Quality and Risk Management

How does a student obtain professional certification as a Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM)® or Project Management Professional (PMP)®?

Both these certifications are administered by PMI. Students need to apply directly with PMI to obtain certification. The following hyperlinks to PMI provide information on certification prerequisites, handbooks, exam content and exam guidance.

Does the student have to write the PMI® certification exam after completing the BCIT Project Management program?

No, it is not mandatory, but it is highly recommended. The BCIT Project Management credential along with a PMI certification will help the student develop a rewarding career.

How does the student arrange to write the PMI® certification exam?

The student needs to apply with PMI directly. Information is explained on the PMI webpages.

What is the difference between the CAPM® and the Project Management Professional (PMP)®?

The PMI Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM)® credential is an entry level certification for individuals new to project management, or those with less experience. Regardless of what stage you are in your career, the CAPM® credential is a definite asset that will distinguish you from others in job search and will also enhance your credibility in working with project teams. Application requirements include:

- Secondary degree (high school diploma, associate's degree or the global equivalent)
- 23 hours of project management education

The PMI Project Management Professional (PMP)® credential is the industry standard certification that demonstrates competence and a solid foundation in project management. The PMP® credential can also provide a significant advantage when it comes to job placement, salary, and earning potential.

Application requirements include:

- With a four-year degree you need 36 months of experience leading projects
- With a high school diploma or an associate's degree you need 60 months of experience leading projects
- 35 hours of project management education

What is the difference between the CAPM and PMP Certification Exam?

The CAPM® Certification Exam is based on 4 Domains (Project Management Fundamentals and Core Concepts, Predictive/Plan-Based Methodologies, Agile Frameworks/Methodologies, Business Analysis Frameworks) with associated Tasks, Enablers, Tools and Deliverables. The *PMBOK® Guide* is only one of the reference materials for study, there is also additional domain specific content required for preparation to write the CAPM® Exam.

The PMP® Certification Exam is based on 3 Domains (People, Process, Business Environment) with associated Tasks, Enablers, Tools and Deliverables. The *PMBOK® Guide* is only one of the reference materials for study, there is also additional domain specific content required for preparation to write the PMP® Exam.

Which credential should the student apply for?

This depends on the student's ability to meet the application requirements. Students with little to no experience should start with the CAPM®. When they get the required experience working on the

job, they could then apply to take the PMP®. Ultimately the PMP® Credential is the most sought-after credential for project management.

Does the BCIT Project Management program prepare the student to write both the CAPM® and the PMP® Certification Exam?

The BCIT Project Management program is structured around the most recent edition of the *PMBOK® Guide* and prepares students for writing the CAPM® Exam. Students that want to write the PMP® Exam will however need to also take the PMP® Certification Exam Prep course [OPMT 0405](#) to fully prepare for writing the PMP® Certification Exam, which provides the latest PMP® Exam format information with all the associated content and reference materials.

Are the BCIT courses available on-line?

Yes, the core courses are available on-line. Students can either attend face-to-face courses or online versions, or a combination.

Possibly, see below on how to contact BCIT Program Advising.

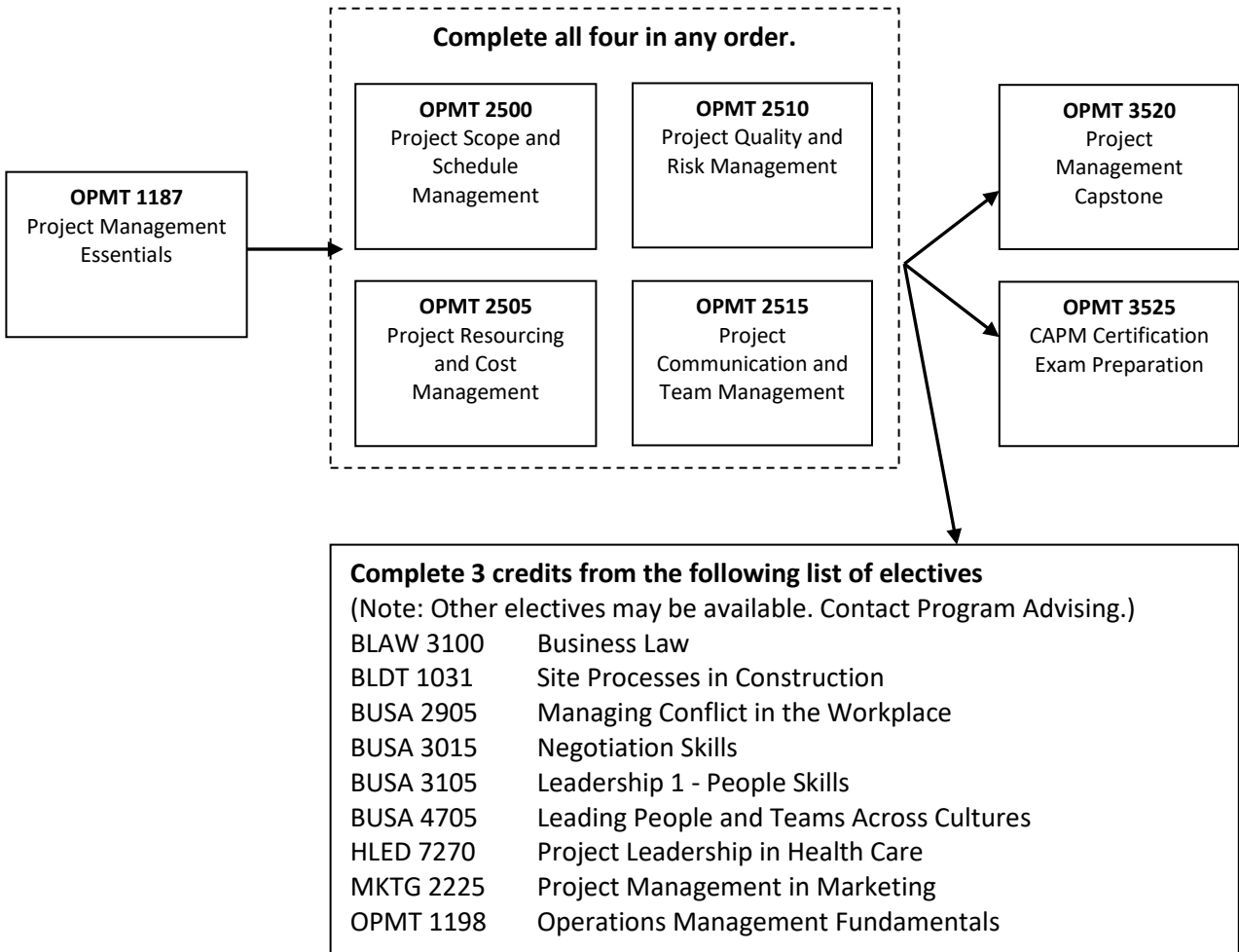
If a student writes and passes either the CAPM® or the PMP® Exam prior to taking OPMT 3525, they can receive credit for OPMT 3525.

Is there a particular order for taking the required courses?

Yes, the following map on the next page shows the course prerequisites. The student can do the following:

- Start with taking OPMT 1187 first.
- After completing OPMT 1187, you could then take 25xx courses concurrently.
- After completing all 25xx courses, you could then take 35xx course concurrently.
